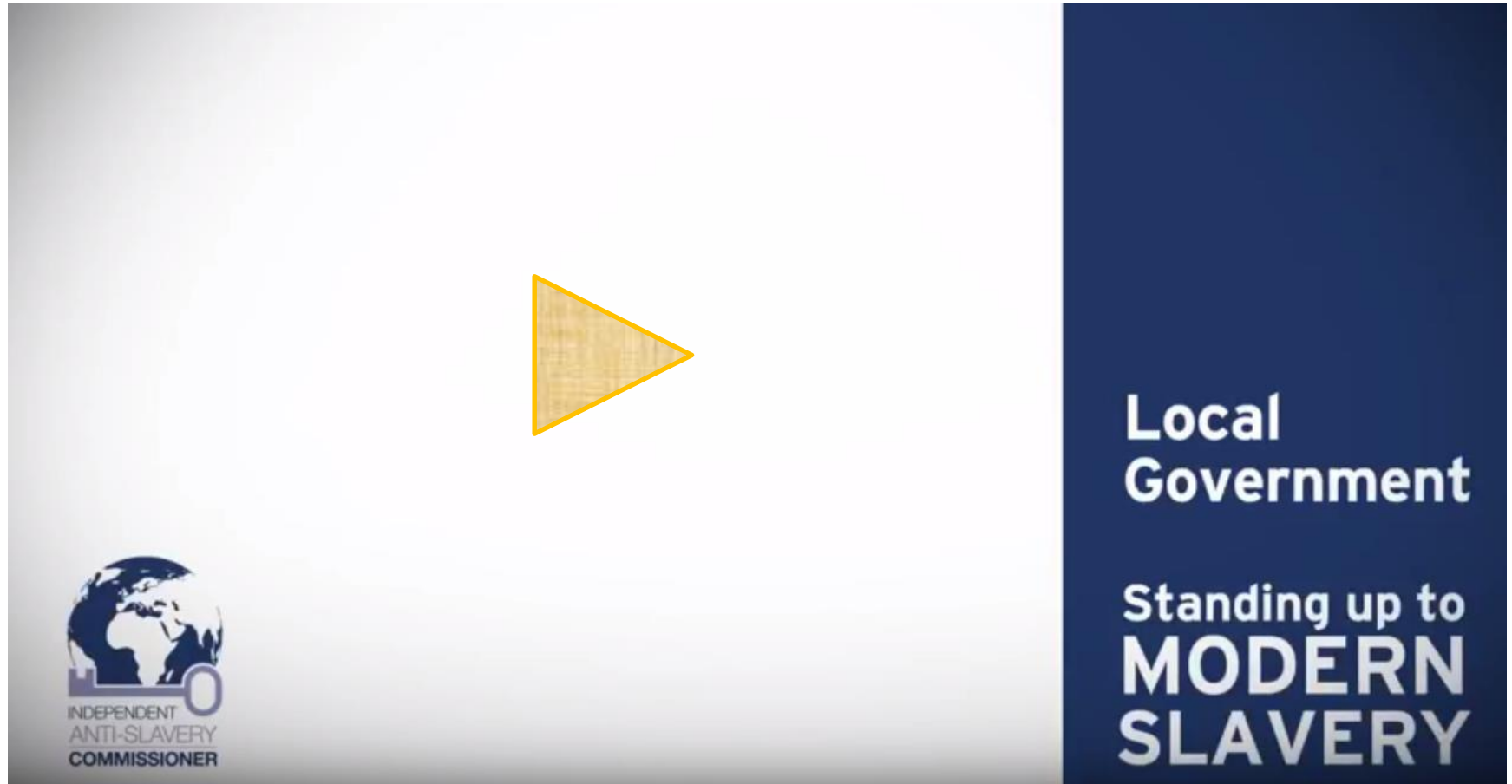


UK Picture

- **Home Office estimate** – 10,000 -13,000 trafficked into the UK each year
- **Recorded potential victims**
 - 2014 – **2340**
 - 2015 – **3266** (40% increase)
 - 2016 – **3805** (17% increase)
- **Age**
 - 66% adults; 34% children
- **Gender**
 - 51% female
 - 49% male
 - 1% transsexual

Facilitator's Commitment

Facilitators are expected to:

- Deliver 2.5 hour multi-agency awareness raising sessions, either in-borough or cross-borough
- Aim to deliver 2-3 sessions in first year (approx. 200 staff)
- Commit to follow up action of reviewing/establishing internal protocols/referral pathways integrated into existing safeguarding protocols
- Promote e-Learning package for all frontline staff who are not reached by face-to-face awareness raising



Impact of Awareness Raising Package

- Equip frontline services across London to know how to identify, respond and report potential cases of modern slavery
- Heightened awareness will lead to more victims of modern slavery being identified and accessing safety
- Promote good practice models and protocols
- Encourage multi-agency response to modern slavery
- Potential for national roll-out and reach
